

MV SEAFOOD COLLABORATIVE

Our Success and Our Future

This was our second season running the Martha's Vineyard Seafood Collaborative, the wholesale seafood market in Menemsha that your support in 2021 helped us purchase, renovate, and re-open. This year our Seafood Collaborative purchased \$395,000 of locally caught, locally landed fresh seafood from 54 individual fishing businesses. By providing a market for our small boat fishing fleet and the infrastructure to catch, unload, and store seafood on the waterfront, we fulfill our mission to help our local commercial fishing businesses and to keep our waterfront working. The top five species we purchased this year were: quahogs (193,168 count), oysters (81,286 count, wild and farmed), black sea bass (35,055 lbs), summer flounder (9,905 lbs), and sea scallops (7,024 lbs).

We then turned around and sold that product to 47 local restaurants, caterers, and markets, providing community members and visitors more options to enjoy fresh, high quality and locally landed seafood. Helping consumers access local catch supports the men and women who work hard to harvest and grow it.

Over the course of this season, we made over 250,000 lbs of ice from our new 5-ton ice machine, generously funded by the Martha's Vineyard Bank Charitable Foundation. This flaked ice was essential in keeping our fishermen's harvests fresh and ready for your plates. Thank you MV Bank Charitable Foundation!

As we look to next year, one of our main goals is to find the right business model and programs to stabilize this wholesale seafood business, allowing it to further its mission of supporting, promoting, and prioritizing our local seafood businesses. The positive economics of landing fish locally is under constant threat, and we see the Collaborative as a potential bulwark against losing our thriving and authentic island fishing operations and the essential infrastructure needed to keep our waterfronts running. We look forward to expanding the services of this program and its positive impact on the community.





As part of our continuing outreach to bring local fishermen and product directly to the people of the island, we participated in several educational and enriching events this year.

At the West Tisbury Library, we joined forces with the MV Shellfish Group (MVSG) and Cottage City Oysters for a talk and demonstration on growing oysters and eelgrass, and the importance of both.

Emma Green Beach, MVSG Executive Director, and Alley McConnell, MVSG Restoration and Communications Director, described how they restore sustainable ovster fisheries and the ecological balance of the island's Great Ponds with their oyster and eel grass work. While shucking their fresh Cottage City Oysters, Dan and Greg Martino talked about everything that goes into running an oyster farm. Everyone got to sample oysters throughout the discussion and bring iced oysters home.

We were guests of the Edgartown Library for their Saltwater Wednesdays program and dove into how to prepare and cook black sea bass and channeled whelk. Also at the library, we fish-printed scup and black sea bass with a group of very fun and artistic kids! It was great to participate in-person again and get people excited about our local marine species.

Seasonal Seafood Guide

Our Chef's Seafood Guide is finished! Drawn from consultations with island chefs, this binder aims to encourage and facilitate use of local seafood species. Each sustainable fish or shellfish has its own page and features information about habitat, diet, season, harvest techniques, and suggested methods of preparation. We plan to publish and distribute the guide in the spring when chefs have more time to consider how they might integrate it into their own operations. All chefs said the binder would be useful both for kitchen and front-ofhouse staff. We also plan to make the pages available on our website, so home cooks or seafood enthusiasts can have access to the information we collected. The guide is illustrated with beautiful pictures of each species, artfully designed by the Division of Marine Fisheries (DMF). We've also created accompanying shorter cards to include with each species delivery as a faster and more direct method of educating staff and, in turn, customers. This project was a collaboration with the Martha's Vineyard Shellfish Group and funded by a DMF Seafood Marketing Grant. We hope it will help to drive local seafood consumption and knowledge!



Fishery Science and Research

Part of our mission is to help our local fishermen fish sustainably. To that end, we have engaged in several research efforts in cooperation with local fishermen, other non-profits, and universities.

In continuation of last year's work, and in partnership with the University of New Hampshire (UNH), we led the field research arm of a study funded by a Saltonstall-Kennedy grant. After months of testing bait recipes and whelk interactions in the lab, UNH master's student Mary Kate Munley was ready with new bait for us to test in the field. The overall goal of this project is to find an effective alternative bait that utilizes less, or no, horseshoe crab, and is lower in cost, reduces environmental impact, and uses sustainable ingredients like waste products and invasive species. Using the Whelk TV, an underwater camera system mounted over a typical conch pot and designed to capture more than 24 hours of day and night footage, we were able to assess which baits were more effective in attracting whelks.

So far, we have tested baits that rely on invasive green crabs and wastes from the clam-processing industry (clam bits and bellies). The numbers have not yet been crunched, but we will continue to modify the recipe and are hopeful it will eventually eliminate or lessen the use of horseshoe crabs as bait.

We are grateful for the help on this project of local conch fisherman Capt. Jason Gale of *F/V Redemption*, and for our summer interns Pierce Aymond and Valeriia Vakhitova for their assistance with over 30 Whelk TV boat trips and hours of trap-video watching! Next summer we will be adding whelk escape-vent research to this project in an effort to hopefully reduce undersized catch.

In continuation of our project last year, we worked with the Commercial Fisheries Research Foundation and Rhode Island Department of Environmental Management on the formation of a Whelk Research Fleet. This summer, eight fishermen from MA and RI were given tablets with a specially designed app to collect whelk biological data while fishing. The tablets allowed fishermen to record shell measurements and upload photos of observations. We hope this type of technology can help expand fisheries-dependent whelk data and our understanding of whelk size distribution and the overall health of this fishery.





In addition, we will look for creative strategies to stabilize our Seafood Collaborative market. These efforts will allow us to continue to buy seafood from local fishing businesses and maintain and expand the needed infrastructure to land seafood safely and efficiently.

We are looking forward to welcoming back the Fishing Partnership, an organization that offers support services to commercial fishermen, to teach their Safety At Sea training and CPR courses on the island this spring. The skills taught in these courses are essential and lifesaving. Anyone who spends time on the water is eligible to take this free 1-day course. Email mvfishermen@gmail.com to sign up.

We also hope to increase our ability to connect fishing permits to local men and women who are ready to grow their operations on the water. We will reach out as these opportunities develop.
